Conversations on Race: A Multi Cultural Approach to Reconciliation

"Let every person be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger."

James 1:19

What a challenging but rewarding time to be in ministry! The Covid 19 Virus has forced many of us to reevaluate our priorities as the props have been knocked out from under us. Over 120,000 people in the USA have died from this virus which is more than we lost in WWI. According to the New York Times "The U.S. jobless rate skyrocketed in the past three months, peaking at nearly 15 percent in April and standing at 13.3 percent in May. That is the highest level since the Great Depression and nearly fourfold increase since February, when the rate was 3.5 percent."

Racial tensions have surfaced since the death of George Floyd. Protesters have taken to the streets demanding justice while looters have taken advantage of this crisis to line their own pockets with stolen goods. How important it is that we humble ourselves before God as we pray for our country and world.

A couple of weeks ago some of us tuned in to the Thrive Conference which reached over 225,000 people in 98 countries. Honest conversations regarding race were unsettling as we heard our brothers and sisters' pain. I personally was filled with hope after hearing Bishop T.D. Jakes, Pastor Miles McPherson, former Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, and Pastor Rick Warren share from their hearts. What better time for the church to step up as we learn together what it means to "Do justice, love mercy and walk humbly with God." Micah 6:8.

Recently I spoke with the other pastors using our facilities about the idea of having a 3 part series entitled Conversations on Race – A Multi Cultural Approach to Reconciliation. They were excited about participating in this series. We will meet outside in front of the Griffith House and show the following videos from the Thrive Conference followed by a different multicultural panel each night.

At the age of 2 she contracted polio, the 13th case in St. Louis. She had to wear a cast and have surgery on her right leg. Going through this trauma, she grew up fast. As young as she was, she knew the Lord was with her. Her school years were spent in St. Louis. She enjoyed visiting the Ozarks and seeing the beauty of it.

After graduating from high school, she attended Central Methodist College in Fayette, MO where she met and married her husband. Seeking the right job, they traveled to 9 different states in 11 years. When she was 20, she gave birth to a daughter, then 4 years later a son.

After her divorce she had to work, but she saved using a Christmas club plan so they would always have a nice Christmas.

Into her life came a man close to her heart - his name was Jack. He was a friend for 20 years and she lost him to a heart attack. The two men in her life treated her well.

She loved the Lord and when she would fall He would always help her up. She taught herself the accordion and played for years. Never meeting a stranger, she enjoys many friends. She talks on the phone and goes everywhere with her electric wheelchair. She loves her independence, gardening and flowers. She has joy in her life, God, her children, her grandchildren, and friends.

Missions' Corner



Andrew and Karen Bush have served internationally for almost 35 years. They seek to make the love of Christ Jesus known through servanthood in the way of the cross.

Here is their recent letter with thoughts on COVID-19:

Dear Friends

We are praying for you during these very difficult days. We are also praying for those who have contracted the virus to be healed, and that Jesus will overcome. We are praying for hope for the 40 million U.S. citizens who are out of work now as a result of the pandemic. 40 million, that is a staggering figure. And approximately 40% of these will no longer be able to return to their previous jobs. At the same time, we are witnessing the deepest cultural divisions in our country being laid bare. The pain that African Americans and other minorities have had to endure for too long needs a transformative response.

How should we respond?

We have been encouraged by seeing brave people reach across the divide to support and be kind to each other. Such acts stand in stark relief to physical violence, and are a ray of hope that a better day can come in which, as Jesus taught, people will love their neighbors as themselves, and even, love their enemies. But this will take a lot of work, prayer, self-examination, and continued commitment to the love of Jesus.



In all of this, rather than draw back, we must push forward in bringing the love and the gospel of Jesus to our neighborhoods and to the world. In May, I was able to transfer several thousand dollars to Harvesters Christian Fellowship in the Philippines to help the most distressed families in our various congregations. Pastor Waven Beguiras, (left) who leads our HCF congregation in a rural province north of Manilla, distributed 2000 pesos (\$40/each) to ten families, including this young mother

and her son. Thank you!!! \$40 is a huge blessing to this humble mother.

The closures in Manila have been very strongly enforced. People are beginning to be able to go out into their neighborhoods. The pastors of HCF are strategizing how to reopen their congregations in shifts in order to satisfy social distancing.

We are continuing to work hard on our reconciliation project in Bethlehem and in leading the East Jerusalem International Church weekly, even though Israel remains closed — and its Tel Aviv airport virtually empty — to international travelers. Israel hopefully will begin to open, as it has indicated, after June 17. This opening will at first only include a few neighboring countries. We are praying that by July travel will be restored for Americans.

Let's hang in there and hang on to Jesus!
