

"The Body of Christ"

A Letter by Pastor Emily

Recently, I preached a sermon from a passage in 1 Corinthians 12 about the diverse gifts God has given each of us.

1 Corinthians 12:12, and 17-27 read:

¹² Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ...

¹⁷ If the whole body were an eye, where would the sense of hearing be? If the whole body were an ear, where would the sense of smell be? ¹⁸ But in fact God has placed the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be. ¹⁹ If they were all one part, where would the body be? ²⁰ As it is, there are many parts, but one body.

²¹ The eye cannot say to the hand, "I don't need you!" And the head cannot say to the feet, "I don't need you!" ²² On the contrary, those parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, ²³ and the parts that we think are less honorable we treat with special honor. And the parts that are unpresentable are treated with special modesty, ²⁴ while our presentable parts need no special treatment. But God has put the body together, giving greater honor to the parts that lacked it, ²⁵ so that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other. ²⁶ If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honored, every part rejoices with it.

²⁷Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it.

As I look at the February calendar, I realize that the month ahead represents how much the Body of Christ here at FCCA matters. Pastor Jim and I look forward to meeting with individuals who are interested in joining the church after worship on Sunday, February 2nd. This New Member's Class will be a wonderful opportunity to talk about what it means to be part of a Congregational church and to have meaningful conversation about our faith journeys and participation in this church family.


This 7-week study will begin on Wednesday, February 19th.

In January, it was an honor to celebrate the life of Jack Gutman, one of JOG's long-time comedians. The Celebration of Life was a beautiful service full of meaningful stories about how Jack touched lives. Jack not only saved lives as a medic in WWII, present at Normandy—he also saved lives after the war through his book, "One Veteran's Journey to Heal the Wounds of War." Jack touched lives wherever he went—from his presence with family and friends to the conversations and prayers he shared with customers during his time working at Walmart. One of the highlights of the service was a video created by Eric Vogelvang that powerfully portrayed Jack's life and legacy. Jack's daughter, Paula Shaw, shared with us the following message that the family received from Eric following the service: To the Gutman family, to be honest, this was the best memorial service I've ever attended. The laughter, love, stories, and songs between family, friends, and strangers is a testament to how your dad actually touched lives. This is a legacy worth pursuing for every life, and my hope is that a little piece of Jack will dwell in all of us to make this side of life a better place to live. All my best to you. Greetings! As we begin this new year, we thank God for signs of new life by God's grace.

After months of praying for a ceasefire with our online East Jerusalem International Church congregation, we can finally give thanks that a ceasefire has been achieved. The images of Gazan

families celebrating and the relief of the families of hostages are such a blessing. At long last the Gazan Christian families sheltering in the two large historic churches can return to their homes, even if they are no longer standing. I pray that these dear children (pictured) whom I met in the Jabalya refugee camp a few years ago in Gaza are still alive. That community has been obliterated.



Through Gaza, the infant Jesus, with Mary and Joseph, traveled to Egypt. We pray that Jesus will pass through again to bind up every wound and sorrow, to open every captive's door. But as an elderly Welsh pastor in our congregations says, we must "pray and pray on" for the true peace of God to deepen and transform both Palestine and Israel. We will do our part to help build a lasting peace. 
(Missions' Corner: Andrew & Karen Bush, Continued...)

The next six months are so full of ministry that our challenge is to decide what <u>not</u> to take on. For a few highlights, we will be leading our on-site peace training in Bethlehem in May, making a presentation at a conference in Amsterdam in June celebrating the 500th anniversary of the founding of the Anabaptist movement, and participating in a peace conference in London in July.

Last year was one of the most difficult in our 46 years of ministry in view of the Gaza war and the crisis our Jerusalem congregation faced. Thank you for standing with us in prayer. Your financial support not only sustained us, but its effect reached far to help Filipino pastors, assist the East Jerusalem International Church to get on its feet, and more. Now, let us work to bring the life of Christ Jesus to our world in 2025!

(Pastor's Letter Continued...)

I have been aware in the last month how grateful I am to be part of the Congregational tradition and the value the tradition places on the life of the individual as well as the collective participation in the Body. Congregational churches believe Jesus Christ is the head of the church and highly value three main tenants: faith, freedom and fellowship.

Faith: We are united around our faith in Jesus.

Freedom: Each local church is autonomous, governing itself as the church prays for God's guidance. Individuals are encouraged to work out their faith in Jesus in a personal way. The church keeps faith conversation centered around Jesus and the scriptures as individuals are given the respect and freedom to think for themselves and to "work out their own salvation" as scripture encourages each of us to do.

Fellowship: While Congregational churches are autonomous churches, they strongly believe in maintaining relationship with the Body of Christ beyond the local church. Therefore, our church is part of a national and an international association of churches, and we value the relationships we have with other churches outside of the Congregational Way as well.

On Sunday, February 23rd, we will have our Annual Congregational Meeting after worship. All are welcome to attend, and members of the church will vote on a proposed budget and on nominated Council Members. The compiled Council Report for the meeting always reminds me how many people it takes for us to operate as a church.

We really do operate as the Body of Christ. My husband, Rick, and I have often marveled at the proportion of church members who are not only consistently present but also volunteer on a regular basis to make church events possible. Many of you help with lunches (women's lunch and JOG), fellowship hour, Sunday School, worship needs (sound, video, projector, music), greeting, facilities projects, rides for individuals and so much more. You also check in on one another and genuinely care. Each of you are deeply appreciated. I continue to pray that God guide each of us as individuals and collectively as a church.
