

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### A Letter from Penny Schibsted

Our church campus is breathing with life provided by God. It is seen through the different people who worship and minister here throughout the week. On Sundays when I arrive, I hear music coming from the sanctuary. It is the people of Unlimited Church. The mostly Pacific Islander congregation has beautiful, strong voices, and they end worship with robust praise to God.

As I walk to the kitchen to prepare coffee and refreshments for FCCA, I hear a female singer rehearsing in the hall for United New Life church. I see people from residential care homes walk in with their care takers as others start to prepare for service. A prayer circle forms and petitions to God are lifted, asking God to bless these people, to be present in worship and to guide them.

Then, different individuals from our own fellowship start to arrive. Some head to the sanctuary to set up the sound system and video. Some practice music. Some set up refreshments. We greet each other. Some of us walk around the beautiful grounds or into the library; greeting, hugging and laughing with people from Unlimited Church. It doesn't matter if we are from different churches, we've gotten to know each other over the years and are friends.

As Sunday School is set up in the Griffith House, music starts in the chapel for Oasis' worship service. This group has their own unique style with a cajón (hand drum) and a contemporary sound. It's fun and earnest.

More gather in the main sanctuary. We hug and catch up with each other. Pastor Emily or Pastor Jim start us with a welcome, announcements and prayer. We join in worship through song. We hear a message. We stay and talk together a good while after. It feels so good to be family together.

Last Sunday we had our Annual Meeting. We ate together and heard about different ministries of the church. Jim Weddell showed wonderful 2024 FCCA highlight videos during worship—one on Missions and Service, and one on Taking Care of Business. It was encouraging to see all that our little church has done and been involved in this past year!

While cleaning up our meal, friends from Iglesia de Dios and El Buen Samaritano began arriving on campus. Iglesia de Dios has been meeting on our campus longer than any of the other groups, almost 30 years. They are a loving and encouraging group. Pastor Samuel will share at our next JOG meeting about an event that recently happened to him. He had an amazing near death experience when his heart stopped, and he was revived. He had a glimpse of the afterlife that was so awesome he did not want to return, but he did. He is still with us and he is glowing from the experience. (Cont. Pg. 7)

It also led me to stop going to church because when I would go to church on Sundays with my family, I would get yelled at right after coming back home from a lovely time at church. In spite of all the imperfections in my life, God still supernaturally showed up in the most random ways in my darkest moments when I felt alone and wanted to waste my life away. God taught me forgiveness even from my worst enemies. Now as an adult, God has brought me to this church, and I am determined more than ever to further my education and to become a registered nurse in order to be there for other people in their darkest moments."

What a year! As we reflect on our accomplishments, we can't help but share them with you, our supporters, who help make all this possible.

**Four New Homes:** In 2024, we were honored to be chosen to join a county pilot program **opening FOUR new homes** - Behavioral Health Bridge Housing Program. One of these homes is exclusively for male veterans.

Conditional Use Permit Victory: We were victorious in the lawsuit against the City of Anaheim. This groundbreaking court ruling eliminates the need for operating permits for transitional and supportive homes with seven or more residents. The City of Anaheim is proud to support and work with Grandma's House of Hope - and the feeling is mutual!

**The Team Behind the Mission:** We've brought on an **all-star team** of Program Managers to run our 12 homes AND a powerhouse Executive Team to lead the organization forward.

**We've Moved:** Our new **headquarters** at 765 The City Drive South, Suite 105, in the City of Orange now combines our Program and Administrative Offices into one central hub, one unified mission.

**Rebranding:** We're rolling out a rebrand of Grandma's House of Hope in early 2025. Stay tuned—it's going to be **transformative**.

**Big things are happening. And we're just getting started.** Supporting Grandma's House of Hope helps take the most vulnerable in Orange County off the streets and gives them hope, healing and restoration.

Monday through Friday families drop off their children at the Montessori School. Chapel is held in the classrooms. Children laugh, play and learn. On Monday evenings, people from Teen Challenge and different group homes come to the campus to share a meal, worship and pray for each other at NorthEast of the Well's Dinner and Worship night. These people are going through desperate situations. Many are in recovery from addictions. While they struggle, they also care well for each other. I could go on. There is an Easter Seals group that meets mid-week in the library. There are different volunteers who come to the church to work on projects and while doing so feel a sense of purpose and connection.

At a time when we daily hear of struggles and conflicts in our country and around the world, it is good to see people working together, encouraging each other, helping the vulnerable, sharing a sense of common emotions, faith and hope. It is so refreshing.

Today I was reading an update from a mission I support called Hope International. Peter Greer, HOPE's president and CEO, addressed inquiries about how different regions they serve are faring with the cuts in USAID funds. While Hope International does not accept government funds, they do ministry in many impoverished areas that do.

Peter Greer writes, "While people of good faith will continue to debate whether it is within or outside the role of the U.S. government to intervene in challenges beyond our nation's borders, Scripture is clear that it is the place of Christ's followers to care for the vulnerable and love our neighbors, near and far (e.g., Proverbs 31:8-9, Isaiah 1:17, Matthew 25:40, Genesis 22:18, Luke 10:25-37). We must not confuse our national response with our Christian mandate. This time of uncertainty and financial precarity for many humanitarian initiatives is a time for the Church to step forward to welcome the stranger, care for the sick, feed the hungry, and invest in communities in poverty. Matthew 25 still provides clarity on our mission to see and respond to those in need, as if we are serving Christ himself."

Reading this felt hopeful to me. I see small things being done on our church campus that remind me that with God's help we can do some good in the world. We can do what we can locally and we can support others who are doing good work for the needy further away. At this time I hope we consider the opportunities we have to help further.

May God guide us as opportunities to serve come our way.
